Beloved Sisters and Brothers,

Thank you so very much for your loving prayers and wishes for returned health.

On July 5, I was admitted to the hospital through the emergency department as I experienced extreme pain and swelling over my body, unable to walk or move within the bed much. It all started with a shingles shot which the doctor said could possibly have been mis-administered into a vein instead of to the muscle. A team of doctors, neurologist, rheumatoid, orthopedic, general practitioner, etc. physicians examined and ran many tests over the five days of my stay; an EKG, three MRIs, two sonograms, and many blood tests including for ALS. No root cause was confirmed; only the shingles shot suspicion remains, which has been documented to have occurred in others.

I have less swelling and less pain now, as I am working through physical therapy. I stand on the word of God. God is yet in control and working for the good of us all. We are in this season of life together; your good is my good and my good is your good. Let us each look to the Lord for that good at this time and at all times. We are to thank God, not necessarily for an adversity but certainly *within* any adversity. I thank God within this illness to know in a very real way that when I am weak, God is strong.

It has been a surprising and unusual experience for me, yet I only look back at it as being slightly frightening to have gone through, as the Holy Spirit was my very present help and comfort in the hospital within my time of uncertainty. I am expected to be back in the pulpit on August 18. Then of course, the Fall begins a busy season with Charge Conference and then Advent and on through the liturgical year.

I am recovering well, resting and healing and I expect to be ready. Yes, I'm healing! Praise the Lord!

The **Annual Western Pennsylvania United Methodist Conference** took place from June 6 to June 8 of this year in Erie, Pa at the Bayfront Convention Center. The annual gathering brought together clergy and lay members from across the region to engage in worship, fellowship and the business of the church. The theme for this year's conference was "Dress for the Harvest," inspired by Luke 10:2, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few."

Key highlights of the conference included:

### 1. Opening Worship and Keynote Address

- \* The Rev. William Meekins Jr. delivered the sermon during the opening worship service, emphasizing the importance of answering God's call to serve amidst the plentiful harvest.
- \*Bishop Cynthis Moore-KoiKoi presided over the conference, addressing the state of the church, the decisions made at the General Conference, where delegates from around the world came together in North Carolina to make decisions for the United Methodist Church and its Book of Discipline. This conference removed any sentences in the Discipline which prevented pastors from marrying same sex partners and any passages that disciplined pastors who did conduct same sex marriages. This is now being left to the individual pastor and church to decide what seems appropriate for them. It also removed passages from the Discipline which did not permit LGBTQ+ people to become pastors. It also removed passages from the Discipline which did not permit LGBTQ+ people to become pastors. Bishop Moore-KoiKoi also emphasized the importance of unity and mission in her opening address.

### 2. Workshops and Discussions:

- \* Various workshops focused on equipping church leaders with tools for ministry, community engagement and spiritual growth.
- \*Discussions were held on critical issues facing the church, including church growth, outreach programs, addressing social challenges and the role of technology in ministry.

### 3. Legislative Sessions

- \* Delegates participated in legislative sessions to discuss and vote on key issues affecting the denomination and local congregations.
- \*Proposals regarding church governance, mission initiatives and financial stewardship were considered and acted upon.
- \*The conference budget for the coming year was reviewed and approved, with a focus on allocating resources to support local churches and outreach programs.

### 4. Fellowship and Networking:

- \*Attendees had opportunities for fellowship, networking and sharing experiences with fellow United Methodists from across the region.
- \*Special events included communal meals, workshop services, and social gathering designed to strengthen the bonds within the church community.

### 5. Closing Ceremony

\*The conference concluded with a service of worship and celebration, sending participants back to their home churches with renewed energy and commitment to their ministries.

The conference served as a time of spiritual renewal, learning and planning for the future, and reflecting on the church's ongoing commitment to its missions and values.

In his book, I Am a Church Member Thom S. Rainer writes,

Offer to make phone calls, join the visitation team, fold newsletters, take part in a fundraiser, make an extra donation to support a project, help in Sunday School, perform special music, the list of opportunities goes on and on.


